Interrogatories

- 1st. - Do you know the parties to this suit, if yea, how long have you known them?
- 2d. - Did you know William Black, in his life time, if yea, is he living or dead, and if dead, when and where did he die?
- 3d. - Did said William Black leave a widow, and if yea, what is her name, age, residence, and condition of health?
- 4th. - Did said William Black leave any children and heirs at law surviving him if yea give their names, ages and residence, and if any married, give the names of their husbands and wives?
- 5th. - Did said William Black, devise, and possessed of real estate, if you look at papers now shown you, marked Exhibits 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 and state whether said papers describe the Real Estate of which he died seized and possessed, where is the same situated, and what is its value?
- 6th. - State whether said Real Estate is susceptible of advantageous division among the heirs of said William Black?
- 7th. - Would it not be to the advantage of the said heirs especially the infants to sell the same and divide the proceeds give your reasons?
- 8th. - State whether said William Black left any personal estate, if yea, who is his Administrator?
