Jane Hammond, the widow of Philip Hammond, an adult over 21 years of age, who resides in New Market District, Frederick County, Maryland.

Lavinia Trundle, the widow of Henry Trundle, an adult, and resident of Frederick County, Maryland.

Singleton Hagan, a single adult, who lives in Frederick County, Maryland.

Those who are dead are as follows:

(1) Mary Ann Hagan, who died in and about the year 1845, being single and at the time of her death.

(2) Charles Hagan, who married Martha Applegate, and who lived in Louisville Kentucky at the time of his death, where his widow still lives, and the children left by him at the time of his death are as follows:—

(1) Charles W. Hagan, who died unmarried since his father's death.

(2) Clarence P. Hagan an infant about eighteen (18) years of age, who resides in Louisville, Kentucky.

(3) Emma G. Hagan, who married James S. A. Baker, both of whom are adults, and residents of Louisville, Kentucky.

(4) Maggie B. Hagan, a single adult, who lives in Louisville, Kentucky.

(5) Mamie J. Hagan, an unmarried infant about 13 years of age, who lives in Louisville, Kentucky.

(3) Richard Hagan, who died leaving a widow Mary E. who lives in Montgomery County, Maryland, the said Richard having died intestate, about the year 1876 leaving the following five (5) children:—

(1) Edgar Hagan, an adult and now resident of the State of Maryland, who lives in the State of Tennessee.

(2) Richard W. Hagan, an adult, who lives in Tennessee.

(3) Alonzo Hagan, an adult who lives in the State of Tennessee.

(4) Eliza C. the wife of Daniel Haylor both of whom are adults and non-residents of the State of Maryland.

(5) Bona, the wife of Daniel J. Huffy, both of whom are adults and non-residents of the State of Maryland.

5th Ques.— State whether the said Adam Hagan, deceased was seized and possessed of any Real estate as the owner thereof at the time of his death, and if yes, where the same was located?

5th Ans.— He was so seized and possessed of a farm in Urbana District, Frederick County, Maryland, consisting of two tracts, and containing about Two hundred and twenty (220) acres.

6th Ques.— Look at the paper writings marked Exhibit No. 1, and Exhibit No. 2, and state whether it was the same land mentioned and described in said Exhibits or paper writings?

6th Ans.— I look at the said Exhibits Nos. 1 & 2, It is the same land described in them that was owned by said Adam Hagan, at the time of his death.

7th Ques.— State whether said Real estate is susceptible of partition or division among the children of said Adam Hagan, and the heirs of such of them, as are deceased, if any, without loss or injury? If not please state your reasons therefor?

7th Ans.— It is not susceptible of being so divided for the reason that the parties interested are too numerous and such division would cause the land to be cut up into too small
