4<sup>th</sup> Int. Look at papers herewith filed marked respectively "Exhibits S. R. W. and M<sup>c</sup>. C. B." and state in whose handwriting the signatures attached thereto are, and all your knowledge herein?

4<sup>th</sup> Ans. I look at "Exhibits S. R. W. and M<sup>c</sup>. C. B." The signatures to said Exhibits are in the handwriting of Randolph M<sup>c</sup>. Whitmore, deceased. I know his handwriting well and also have heard him say that he had given those notes.

5<sup>th</sup> Int. What, if any thing has been paid on said indebtedness?

5<sup>th</sup> Ans. None of the principal on said notes have been paid, but since his death I have paid the interest on \$1470.<sup>00</sup> of this indebtedness, up to December, 29<sup>th</sup>, 1881, and on the remainder of the indebtedness the interest has been paid up to June 1<sup>st</sup>, 1879, partly by my husband in his lifetime and partly by me as his Executrix since his death.

6<sup>th</sup> Int. Is said Lucie R. Whitmore now single or married? State all your knowledge herein?

6<sup>th</sup> Ans. She is married and is the wife of Mr. Samuel J. Hoffman.

7<sup>th</sup> Int. Was, or was not Randolph M<sup>c</sup>. Whitmore at the time of his death indebted to Margaret Martz wife of Lewis Martz? If yes, state the particulars thereof and what part thereof has been paid?

7<sup>th</sup> Ans. He was. He was indebted to her on a note for \$35.<sup>00</sup> dated September 24<sup>th</sup>, 1877, payable six months after date with interest from date. I have seen the note, but it is either lost or destroyed. No part of the principal of said note has been paid, but I have paid the interest on the same up to September 24<sup>th</sup>, 1881.

8<sup>th</sup> Int. Was or was not the personal estate of your husband sufficient to pay all debts due by him at the time of his death?

8<sup>th</sup> Ans. It was not.
