Ans. No, sir, we dealt with James A. Oudorff alone and nobody else.

9th Int. What buildings did you put up for James A. Oudorff, upon said Wagon tract?

Ans. A Barn, a Blacksmith shop, a chicken house, a dairy and ice house, a wash house, a bake house, and smoke house, &c., and a spring.

10th Int. What was the cost of said buildings; state as nearly as you can?

Ans. Our work, the carpenter work, was about two thousand dollars, (2,000 \$.) He furnished the materials and all other labor; the cost of the buildings was about five thousand dollars (5,000 \$.)

11th Int. State what James A. Oudorff said, if any thing, in regard to the site of said buildings and ownership of the land?

Ans. He said old John Oudorff, his father-in-law, wanted him to build on the Rife tract, but he'd put the buildings on his own land and then he would know what he was about.

12th Int. What land did he designate as his own, on which the buildings were to go?

Ans. The tract he bought from John Wagon.

13th Int. State if you can, the year in which this conversation took place?

Ans. About February, 1872.

14th Int. Did, or did not, Mary E. Oudorff give any directions in regard to said work?

Ans. She saw all the work going on, but never gave any directions in regard to it.

James A. Elder, a minor of lawful age, produced upon the part of the Complainants, being duly sworn and examined to interrogatories filed with the Commissioner by the Complainants, and herewith returned, deposes and says:

To the 1st Int. Are you, or not, acquainted with the parties to this suit; if so, how long have you known them?

Ans. I knew them all, except Eliza Cause, and have known them for some years.

2nd Int. Are you acquainted with the real estate, spoken of, as the Wagon tract, in this case?

Ans. I know where it is located and that it contains fifty-eight (58) acres.

3rd Int. State all you know in regard to the purchase of the said real estate from John Wagon, and as to the payment of the purchase money?

Ans. The note for the last payment of the purchase money, given by James A. Oudorff to John Wagon, was for One hundred and fifty dollars (150 \$.) to the best of my recollection; the note specified that (that) was the final payment on the land; I received the note from Mr Wagon as cash, for value received;
