In pursuance of the annexed order of the Court, and notice given me by the solicitor for the Plaintiffs in the above entitled cause, I, Clayton O. Keedy one of the Regular Examiners of said Court, duly appointed, qualified and sworn, having met on the twenty-fifth day of August A.D. 1885, at my law office in Frederick City, and assigned the twenty-seventh day of August in the place aforesaid, as the time and place for taking the testimony in this cause, and having given due notice thereof to the parties concerned, did, at the appointed time and place proceed to take the following evidence to-wit:-

The Plaintiff filed with the Examiner, as evidence Exhibits Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4, "C.M.H." which are herewith returned by the said Examiner Charles M. Haller, a witness of lawful age produced on the part of the Plaintiffs being, duly sworn, and examined to Interrogations filed with the Examiner, and herewith returned deposes and says:

To the 1st Interrogatory

1st Ans. I don't know all of them, and no one man living knows them all. I know a large part of them. I know all those who are residents of Frederick and a large proportion of those who reside elsewhere.

To the 2nd Inter.

2nd Ans. I look at the Bill of Complaint. I believe all the names therein mentioned, are the heirs-at-law and descendants of Francis, Peter, David, Isaac, and John Mantz the sons of Casper Mantz, the old man.

To the 3rd Inter.

3rd Ans. I am a descendant of a sister of those five sons of Casper Mantz Sr.

To the 4th Inter.

4th Ans. It embraces Lot No. 211, on the plot of Frederick fronting on 4th Street, and bounded on the West by Clinchards Alley. It fronts one hundred and ten feet more or less on Fourth Street and is eighty feet more or less in depth. It has been used exclusively as far as I know, as a burying ground, up to 1853, or 1854. Since then no person has been buried in it, and no use has been made of except a portion of it has been cultivated as a garden by Mr. Kussman, who obtained from some of the parties interested, permission to so use it in consideration of taking care of the premises.
