worth. I should suppose. His Personal Estate was not sufficient to pay this debt; what other debts he owed I don't know.

4th Int. Did said Asbury Riggs die seized of any Real Estate? If yes, describe the same, and state its value, and look at Exhibits Nos. 3 & 4 now shown you, and state whether they describe the same?

Ans. He did die seized and possessed of Real Estate. That described in Exhibit No. 3 is worth about \$350. - And that described in Exhibit No. 4 is worth about \$100 - They are both situated in Frederick County and are described in said Exhibits.

5th Int. Did said Asbury Riggs leave a widow? If yes, what was her name and is she living or dead?

Ans. He left a Widow, named Lyle, or Delia, who has died since her husband.

6th Int. Did said Asbury Riggs leave any children, or other heirs at law? If yes, state their names, ages, residences and if any are married the same facts regarding their husbands, or wives?

Ans. He left Three children, or his heirs at law: (1) A Son John Albert Riggs who is an Adult, whose wife's name I don't know, both of whom live in West Pleasant District, in Frederick County (2) A Son Merrick Riggs who is about 2 1/2 years of age, whose residence I don't know (3) A Son Steward Riggs who is an infant and who resides in Frederick County.

1st Int. Did you know St. Asbury Riggs late of Frederick County? If yes, is he living or dead, and if dead when, and where, did he die?

Ans. - I know him. He is dead; he died in Frederick County in the Summer of 1885.

2nd Int. Look at the Papers now shown you marked Exhibit Nos. 1 & 2, and state in whose hand-writing they are, and if in your hand-writing, at whose request were they written?

Ans. I look at them. They are in my hand-writing. I wrote them at the request of St. Asbury Riggs.

3rd Int. Did you see St. Asbury Riggs sign his name, or make his mark to said papers, and for what were they given?

Ans. I saw him make his marks there, and signed the same myself as witness. They were given for some purchase money due Mr. Samuel Stike for some land.

3rd Int. Do you or not know whether said Notes have been paid? State all your knowledge therein?

Ans. I do not know; but I know that St. Asbury Riggs died before the notes were due and after his death his widow came to me and said they were not paid, and talked of selling some of the property to pay them. I told her she could not do this without a decree because some of the parties were not of age, and advised her to get some one to take up the Notes.
