At the request of Charles Broadrup, the following deed was recorded November 4th 1856.

This deed made this Fourth day of November A.D. eighteen hundred and fifty six by Peter Morgan and George W. Morgan. Witnesseth that in consideration of the sum of Two thousand four hundred dollars, the said Peter Morgan and George W. Morgan do grant unto Charles Broadrup all that tract of land called Partnership, Situate and lying in Frederick County State of Maryland and contained within the following courses and distances. Beginning for the outlines thereof at a large stone at the end of the 19th line of the whole tract called "Partnership" it being the end of the 8th line of the Pawyard Farm then by and with said 8 line reversed north thirty five and a half degrees East seven and one quarter perches to a large stone planted at the end of the 2nd line of Partnership then by and with the 3rd line thereof north sixty degrees East sixty six perches to a stone on the north side of the road being a corner of the deed from Adam Stull to Fredk. Ransburg dated 19th July 1831. then East thirty one and eighth tenth perches north three and a half degrees West six teen & three fourth perches to the end of twenty five perches on the 10th line of a tract of land called "The Reservoir on Stony Hill" and "Shomaker's Choice" then with said line reversed north sixty degrees East seven and eight tenths perches to a large stone at the end of the 6th line of a tract of land called "John's Home" then by and with the South line thereof South sixty one degrees East twenty one and a half perches to a stone at the end of Seventeen
