The said Edward N. Brunner was at the time of his death seized and possessed of a piece of property situated in the South Side of East 7th Street in Frederick City, Frederick Co. Md. I look at Exhibit No. 3, and that correctly describes the said real estate. I think the property is worth about \$900.

He left personal property amounting to about \$2500 according to the appraisement returned in the orphan court, and his indebtedness is considerably more than that sum. So that his personal estate will not be sufficient to pay all his debts and funeral expenses.

Letters of Administration on his personal estate were granted to his son Grayson C. Brunner.

William M. Bofet. (the Plaintiff) a witness of lawful age produced on the part of the Plaintiff being duly sworn and examined Viva Voce depone and says as follows:—

my name is William M. Bofet; my age 49 years; I reside in Frederick, Md. and I know all the parties to this suit:—

I knew Edward N. Brunner in his lifetime. He is dead. He died on or about March 30, 1908, and died intestate.

He left an widow but left nine children whose name and ages and the names of the husbands or wives, are correctly given by the preceding witnesses whose testimony I have heard.

He left a house and lot on East 7th Street in Frederick, Frederick County, Md. which is correctly described in Exhibit No. 3. filed with the Bill and now shown me. The said real estate is worth about \$900.

He left personal property worth about \$2500, according to the appraisement, and he owed at the time of his death, more
