3. Did you know William Williams in his life-time, is he living or dead, if dead when did he die, did he die testate or intestate?

Ans. I knew William Williams in his life time. He is dead having died June 24, 1901, intestate. I have been acting as his administrator, the Orphan's Court of this County having granted letters of administration to me.

4. What is the value of the personal estate of William Williams?

Ans. Five hundred and sixty five dollars.

5. Is his personal estate sufficient to pay all his debts?

Ans. It is not sufficient.

6. What real estate did the said William Williams leave at the time of his death, if any, and what is its value?

Ans. He left a farm containing about 150 acres situated in Urbana Dist. Frederick County, and about 1 acre of land situated near Spawville this County. The farm is worth about \$2500 and the acre at Spawville is worth I suppose about \$3500.

7. Did William Williams leave any debtors or kindred surviving him at the time of his death?

Ans. He did not. He has often told me he had no kindred or relatives. He left a widow Ann Williams surviving him who died a short time after he died. Both William Williams and his wife died intestate.

8. What knowledge have you, if any of the claim of Mamie Thomas, filed in this Cause as Ex. No. 6, to the Bill of Complaint.

Ans. I know that she has been working at Mr. Williams since the Summer of 1883, up to the time of his death, with the exception of an interval of about 17 months. She worked very faithfully for Mr. Williams, and when he kept dairy did all she could, she did all the milking. Her services were worth over hundred dollars per year.

As to the amount loaned, I know that she had money of her own, and that Mr. Williams borrowed money from her at times. He got Clover seed from me at one time and borrowed
