13th That the State Bank Commissioner, acting through his deputy, did accordingly on the 14th day of November 1910. take charge of Said bank and its assets and closed its doors.

That your petitioners are advised, believe and so charge that in this condition of affairs, for the promotion of the property of Said Corporation, and with an end to a proper, just and equitable protection and enforcement of the rights of all parties concerned, it is highly desirable and proper for your Honors to appoint some suitable person or persons receivers of Said Savings Bank to take charge of its assets and property, under the direction of your Honorable Court and to ascertain the condition of Said Bank as near as its condition can, under the circumstances be ascertained, and to report the same to your Honorable Court for such future action as may be deemed proper and equitable. #

15th. That depositors having interest bearing deposits in Said bank are numerous and scattered and it is impossible to get them together to decide on any policy of action within time to take such prompt proceedings as the condition and affairs of Said bank call for.

Wherefore your petitioners pray your Honors to appoint some suitable person or persons receiver of Said Savings Bank of Brunswick and direct them to take charge of its assets and property and preserve the same and to ascertain the condition of Said bank and report the same to your Honorable Court for future action in the premises.

And for such other and further relief as the nature or Equity of their case may require And as in duty lie.
