whole purchase money, and not before the said Trustee, by a good and sufficient deed to be executed and acknowledged according to law, shall convey to the purchaser or purchasers of the said property, and to his, her or their heirs the property to him, her or them, well free, clear, and discharged of all claim of the parties to this cause, and of any person or persons claiming by, from, or under them; and the said Trustee, shall bring into this Court the money arising on such sale or sales, and the bonds or notes which may be taken for the same to be disposed of under the direction of this Court, after deducting therefrom the costs of this suit and such Commission to the said Trustee as the Court shall think proper to allow on consideration of the skill, attention, and fidelity wherewith they shall appear to have discharged their trust.
