The bill prays for the following relief to-wit--That the real estate of the said Moses Brooks may be sold and the proceeds applied to the payment of the claim of the Complainant and such other creditors of the said Moses Brooks who may come in and contribute to the costs and expenses of this proceeding, and the residue paid under the direction of the Court.

It is therefore this 30th day of April, in the year 1913, ordered by the Circuit Court for Frederick County inequity that the plaintiff by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in some newspaper published in Frederick County once in each of four successive weeks before the 31st day of May A. D. 1913, give notice of said absent defendants of the object and substance of this bill, warning them to appear in this court in person or by solicitor on or before the 16th day of June A. D., 1913, and shew cause if any they have why a decree ought not to be passed as prayed.

In the circuit Court for Frederick County in Equity.

The object of this bill is to procure a decree for the sale of certain real estate in Frederick County, Md., of which Moses Brooks died, seized and possessed, for the purpose of paying the debts of the said Moses Brooks.
