

TESTIMONY.

To the Honorable the Judges of said Court--

The above being at issue and notice having been given to me by the Solicitors for the Plaintiff, of a decree to take testimony in said cause, leave of the Court having been had and obtained, I D. Princeton Buckey, one of the Standing Examiners of the Circuit Court for Frederick County, duly appointed Qualified and sworn, met at the law offices of Stoner & Weinberg, in Frederick City Maryland, on Tuesday the 23rd day of May at the hour of 2 o'clock P. M., and then and there in the presence of the solicitors for Plaintiff and the witnesses, proceeded to take the following depositions, that is to say--Present.

Frank L. Stiner, Esq. and the witnesses.

DR. Charles A. Stults, a witness of lawful age, the plaintiff in this suit, having been duly sworn deposes and says--

My name is Charles A. Stults, 44 years of age. I reside in Woodsboro, Md. I am the Plaintiff in this suit.

2nd. Did you know George W. Long in his lifetime, if yes, is he living or dead, if dead where did he die, and did he die seized of any real estate in Frederick County, and if so of what does it consist?

Ans.--I knew George W. Long, He died about the 3rd day of May 1911, intestate, and was seized of a piece of real estate situated at New Midway, Frederick County, I look at Exhibit 1 filed with the bill and it correctly describes the property.

3. Whom did he leave as his heirs at law?

Ans.--A widow, Annie M. Long, who is living and is about 36 years of age, and Frank Long and Carrie Long, infant children aged about 17 and 15 years respectively. He left no personal property sufficient to administer upon and there has been no administration granted on the same.

4th. State what debts were due and owing by the said George W. Long at the time of his death.

Ans--He was indebted to my by his Judgment 112 Trials, Dec. term 1910 in the Circuit Court for Frederick County, for the sum of \$149.85, Exhibit No. 2 describes the indebtedness correctly.

Also the sum of \$56.62 by his judgment which is correctly described in Exhibit No. 3, Also in the sum of \$925.00 by his Judgment 115 trials, Dec. Term, 1909, that is correctly described by Exhibit No. 4. Also the sum of \$12.00 on open account for professional services rendered. Exhibit No. 5 filed with the bill correctly describes that. He was also indebted to the Woodsboro Savings Bank in the sum of \$41.43 by his Judgment that is correctly described by Exhibit No. 6, Filed with the bill. he was also indebted to the woodsboro Savings Bank by his promissory note dated May 2nd 1911 for the sum of \$50.

The real estate of which he died seized is worth about \$1500.00, and the personal property I know is wholly inadequate to pay his debts.

To the Gen. Int.

Nothing more only there may be more debts outstanding than those I have Stated.

I have heard the testimony given by the witness Charles A. Stults, read and believe his statements correct, I knew George W. Long in his lifetime, remember the occasion of his death, he left surviving him a widow and two children described by the witness, Charles A. Stults, I look at Exhibits Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 they correctly represent the amount of debts in each described owing by Geo. W. Long at the time of his death, he was also indebted to the Woodsboro Savings Bank in the sum of Fifty Dollars. He left little personal property what he had was wholly inadequate to pay his debts I believe he died intestate. The real estate of which he died possesses is worth about fifteen hundred dollars, and is correctly described by Exhibit No. 1.
