Whereas by my will dated on the eight day of November in the year eighteen hundred and sixty seven, I did devise and bequeath to my wife for and during her life, certain devises and bequests, which devises and bequests are now void, because of her death, and whereas interest is chargeable upon certain legacies from the death of my wife, I now direct that interest shall be chargeable from my death, and whereas I did bequeath certain specific pecuniary and general residuary legacies to my daughter Elva W. Davis, wife of Joab Davis, and whereas said Joab Davis owes me three notes each of the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, Now I make this codicil to my last will as follows, I do will and direct that in case the said Joab Davis shall not pay me the said three notes in his life and said notes or any part thereof shall remain due and owing to me at my death then I will and direct that the legacies bequeathed to my daughter Elva W. Davis shall be chargeable therewith and that the said notes or such parts thereof as shall remain unpaid shall be deducted from the legacies bequeathed to my said daughter Elva W. Davis, and the same and the interest thereon shall be deemed and taken as if advanced to my said daughter Elva W. Davis. In testimony whereof I George F. I, George F. Kindley sen. of Frederick County, do make this my second codicil to my last will and testament by me executed on the 8th day of November 1867 as follows--Whereas by said last will and testament I did devise to my daughter Miranda E. Boyer the residue of my Home Farm not devised to my son Sebastian--Now it is my will and I do so direct that in case my said daughter Miranda E. Boyer, should die before her husband Wesley Boyer, then the said Wesley Boyer shall have a home upon said real estate so devised to my said daughter Miranda E. as long as he, the said Wesley Boyer shall live, upon his paying to my executor, for the benefit of my estate the sum of One Hundred Dollars annually, and also all taxes that may be levied or assessed upon said real estate, and which said sum of one hundred dollars annually shall be equally divided among the balance of my children per stirpes, said Wesley Boyer to have the right to cultivate said land in a farm like manner, but shall not cut any more timber therefrom than is necessary for his use upon the farm and after the death of said Wesley Boyer said real estate shall go to my children then living and the descendants of any then dead as in my said will is directed.
