Q. Was the funeral held from that house? (objection)

A. I think the funeral was at that house, i think the sermon was preached at that house.

Q. Did Mr. Ridenbaugh have any relatives living in Brunswick at the time of his death? (Objection)

A. I understood that Mr. Bond was related, I only know what he said. (Objection)

Q. Do you know whether Mr. Ridenbaugh left any property or estate?

A. Not to my own personal knowledge.

Q. I show you a paper marked Exhibit C., please tell what it is?

A. This is a bill for funeral expenses.

Q. Is it a correct Bill?

A. Yes sir, it is.

Q. Are the charges made on that bill the usual charges?

A. Yes sir, they are.

(Exhibit Marked "C" filed in evidence)

Q. Who ordered the flowers for the funeral? (Objection)

A. Mr. Bond ordered me to get them.

Q. Has the bill ever been paid?

A. No sir.

Q. have you received any security or satisfaction for it?

A. No sir.

Q. How long did you know Mr. Ridenbaugh?

A. I do not know, I have been in Brunswick 20 odd years and I think I Have known him all that time. I do not just know when I first met him. (Objection).

Q. What was his physical condition as to being crippled? (Objection)

A. he had one limb off. (OBjection)

Where did he live in Brunswick?

A. I judge in the restaurant he was running right across there from the depot, I do not know if he slept there.

Q. Did he conduct a restuarant there? (Objection)

A. Yes, sir.

Q. Do you know how long he was in business? (Objection)

A. No sir.

Q. Was he a large or small man? (Objection)

A. He was not very tall, he was stout.

Q. Do you know what aged man he was when he died?

A. No sir, i do not know.

Q. You know Charles Bond?

A. Yes sir i do.

Q. Did you ever see him in the restaurant?

A. No sir i never frequented that place. i do not think i was ever in there more than 2 or 3 times in my life, i do not recall seeing him in there.

Q. Was Mr. ridenbaugh married or single man?

A. Single so far as I can ascertain.

Q. The general interrogatory. A. Nothing further.
