

A. I suppose until he died.

Q. Who did he die?

A. I do not know if it was in 1909 or 1910.

Q. Outside of your working there how frequently did you go there?

A. I was there nearly every day.

Q. How long would you be there at a time?

A. Sometimes half an hour sometimes an hour.

Q. At meal times?

A. Yes sir.

Q. It is quite a loafing place there? (Objection)

A. No sir I cannot say that it is, some few people went in there and stayed there for a while.

Q. When people came in there most any of those there would wait on them? (Objection)

A. No sir.

Q. You never seen anybody else serve meals there?

A. Yes sir I seen them carry out soup, Mr. Barrick carried soup out.

Q. Do you know how early Bond got there or when he left at night?

A. I would leave there about 11 o'clock and he was always there then.

Q. Didn't Bond sleep there?

A. Yes sir at the house.

Q. He made his home with Sam?

A. I do not know if you would call it a home.

Re-Direct cross Examination--

Q. When did you work 40 days, what year?

A. Several years ago.

Q. You did not mean to say that Chas. Bond was only there 6 or 7 times?

A. No sir, I saw him there different times.

Q. The general interrogatory was asked?

A. Nothing more.

Tuesday August 26 1913, met at the office of Stoner and Weinberg at 10.30 o'clock

A. M. and took the following depositions--

Mr. William L. Wigington, re-called by consent of parties, by Mr. Wineberg.

1. Mr. Wigington, you testified before, I believe, did you not?

A. Yes sir.

2. And you were asked this question--"Did you ever have a conversation with Samuel Ridenbaugh regarding Charles Bond?" and you answered "No sir". Later you were asked the question--"Did Mr. Ridenbaugh ever say anything about Mr. Bond to you."

And you then related a conversation you had with him. But you were not asked on direct examination as to the time that conversation occurred. On cross examination you testified that the conversation which you have narrated occurred about three years before Mr. Ridenbaugh's death, now the question that I want to ask is this--Did you have any conversation with him, Mr. Ridenbaugh, after the one that you have already narrated. (Ex. to.)

A. Yes sir.

3. When was it?

A. It was about 8 or 9 months, I suppose before Mr. Ridenbaugh died.

4. Mr. Ridenbaugh died in July 1912 didn't he?

A. Yes sir.
