Sappington had the following children, all of whom are still living; namely, Estelle Sappington who is intermarried with Artie Angell, now Estella Angell, Both, of whom are adults and reside in Baltimore City, Maryland; Charles W. Sappington, who intermarried with Nettie M. Lugenbeel, nor Nettie M. Sappington, Lillian Sappington unmarried, Sarah A. Sappington, unmarried, and Carrie M. Sappington, unmarried, all of whom are of full age, and Cora Sappington, an infant, unmarried, all of whom reside in Frederick County, Maryland.

A. he died seized of five tracts of real estate; First a farm on the right hand side of the Libganore road, going South of Unionville, Frederick County, Maryland, part of which was deeded to Greenberry R. Sappington by the Dorsey sisters and part of which he bought from the estate of Randolph Dorsey, and a wood lot bought from Perry Lowman and wife, This property he devised to R. Fannie and Charles B. Sappington. 2nd A farm with improvements thereon, containing two hundred and two acres of land, more or less, situated about one and one-half miles South of Unionville, Frederick County Maryland, which was conveyed to Greenberry R. Sappington by Sarah A. Sappington, et al., 3rd. A tract of timber land containinf twelve acres and forty square rods of land, which was conveyed to Greenberry R. Sappington by Christian Bear and wife. 4th A house and lot, situated on the West side of South Main street in Union Bridge, Carroll county, Maryland, which was conveyed to Greenberry R. Sappington by Ambrose S. Whitehill. 5th. Two building lots in Union Bridge, in Carroll County, Maryland, described as lots Nos. 14 and 15 in Block No. 2, of Bellvue addition to Union Bridge, which said lots were attempted to be conveyed to Greenberry R. Sappington by S. Raymond Senseney.
