

in this case, upon his filing his duly approved bond herein as such receiver in the sum of \$1000. And it is further ordered and decreed that the said property, excepted as above specified, shall be and remain in the custody and possession of the receivers hereinbefore appointed, who shall sell the same as soon hereafter as practicable and either at public or private sale as in their judgment shall be most advantageous to the parties interested therein, said sale to be subject to the approval and confirmation of this Court, and the said receivers shall bring into this Court the money arising from such sale or sales, to be disposed of under the direction of the Court. And it is further adjudged and ordered that out of the said fund they shall allow to the said lessor, as a preferred claim under the terms of said lease, the sum of Three Hundred Dollars, rent in arrears, and the further sum of Sixty-five dollars, premium on insurance policy paid by the said Manasseh Repp, as shown by the testimony in said case, subject to the further order of this Court, the balance of said purchase money to be distributed to the parties entitled thereto, as aforesaid, under the further order and direction of this Court.
