

Sheriff of Frederick County, who has levied upon the personal property of said Charles W. Boyer, including his half interest in 28 acres of corn in shock, a half interest in about 12 loads of timothy hay, a half interest in about 12 loads of pure clove hay, and a half interest in about 4 loads of clover seed not hulled, also upon the said real estate containing 133 acres of land, before described; the other half interest in said growing wheat, corn, hay and clover seed being the property of your Orator; a copy of said levy and a schedule of the property levied upon, under said execution, being herewith filed marked Exhibit No. 6, and the said L. E. Summers & Sons have procured a writ of fieri facias to be issued by the said George R. Dennis, Justice of the Peace, upon their said judgment, directed to the said Sheriff of Frederick County, and under which a levy has been made upon 1 Delaval Cream Separator, 1 Writing Desk, 1 Clock and 1 Dinner Bell, as the property of said Charles W. Boyer.

7. That the said Charles W. Boyer has left said farm and gone beyond the limits of Frederick County, and possibly the State of Maryland, and his exact whereabouts is unknown to your Orator, and he has abandoned the said farm.

8. That your Orator is still in possession of said farm and occupying the same, but has not the means available to continue the cultivation and proper management thereof, nor to employ the labor necessary to gather the corn crop or clover seed and other property owned in common, to prepare the same property for market, and for said Sheriff to sell the said personal property of the said Charles W. Boyer and his undivided interest in the property owned by him and your Orator in common would result in great loss to and sacrifice thereof.

9. That your Orator is the owner of an undivided half interest in said real estate subject to the judgment lien before stated of the said Middletown Savings Bank, and is especially interested in having the personal property of said Charles W. Boyer sold and disposed of upon the best terms in order that the largest amount may be realized therefrom to be applied upon the said judgment lien of the said Middletown Savings Bank and relieve your Orator's half interest in said real estate from the burden of said judgment as far as practicable.

10. That said Charles W. Boyer, besides being indebted as hereinbefore mentioned, is also indebted to sundry other persons in various amounts, and is in the opinion of your Orator insolvent, and he does so charge, and having abandoned said farm nearly four weeks ago and his whereabouts being unknown, it will be to the interest and advantage, not only of your Orator but also of all other parties in interest, for your Honorable Court to appoint a Receiver to take charge of all said property, and personal, and use and dispose of the same under the order and direction of your Honorable Court and apply the interest of said Charles W. Boyer in the proceeds to the payment of his debts and liabilities in the order of their priority, and that without such Receiver to take charge of and care for said personal property, pending the gathering of said crops and the sale of said property, the same is liable to and in danger of being wasted and sacrificed.

11. That all of said Defendants are residents of Frederick County, with the exception of said Charles W. Boyer, whose whereabouts is unknown, and they are all adults

And Your Orator prays for the following relief!

(1) That a Receiver or Receivers may be appointed by your Honorable Court to take charge of all of said property of said Charles W. Boyer and protect and preserve the same and use and dispose of the same as your Honorable Court may direct.

(2) That John D. Conard, Jr., Sheriff of Frederick County, may be restrained by order of your Honorable Court from selling the said property upon which he has made levies as aforesaid, or from proceeding further with the execution of said
