

- 1x. Your husband was engaged in business in Frederick?

- 9x. What bills, if any, did you pay?
 A. Some fish and oyster bills. Bills in the business.
- 10x. Did you keep any account of these bills?
 (Excepted to)
 A. No, sir.
- 11x. You just applied that money to your own use?
 A. But I didn't have much to apply to anything.
- 12x. You didn't keep any accounts at all?
 A. No, sir.
- 13x. You don't know how much you received from your husband's business?
 A. No, sir.
- 14x. Can you estimate it?
 (Excepted to.)
 A. No, sir.
- 15x. Was it \$100?
 A. No, sir, no indeed.
- 16x. Was it \$50?
 (Excepted to)
 A. I don't think it was over \$25.
- 17x. How much stock was in the store at the time of his death?
 (Exception noted)
 A. I don't know really how much it was.
- 18x. You don't know that he owned a carriage?
 (Excepted to.)
 A. He owned a carriage and an old horse.
- 19x. What became of the horse and carriage?
 (Excepted to)
 A. I sold the horse, carriage and a wagon, but I made them an offer down there if they could use the horse that they could have it. I couldn't use it, so I had to sell it.
