LIZZIE WISE, a witness of lawful age, being first duly sworn and produced on the part of the plaintiffs, and examined viva. voce, deposes and says as follows:-

My name is Mrs. Lizzie Wise. I live in Middletown, Frederick County, Maryland, and am a witness of lawful age. I know all the parties to this cause, and am one of the plaintiffs therein. I knew Isaac Michael in his lifetime. He was my grandfather. During his lifetime, and at the time of his death, he owned several small pieces of land, aggregating three acres in all, and located near Quebeck school-house, in Middletown District. I look at "Exhibit A and B" which are now handed me. They are two Mortgages, the first dated the 14th day of September, 1858. It is executed by Daniel Reeder, and it correctly described a part of the land of which my grandfather died, seized and possessed. The other mortgage, "Exhibit B", dated April 22, 1851, correctly describes the other portion of land which goes to make up the three acres mentioned in these proceedings. I always thought my grandfather had a deed for this property, but upon vestigation of the records, I understand that he had not; that he acquired this property from M. Zimmerman, a Sheriff of Frederick County, in or about the year 1864. However, nobody has disputed my grandfather's title to this land, and he lived on the property all his life. My grandfather, the said Isaac Michael, died about 31 years ago, to the best of my recollection. He left no will, but left the following children and heirs-at-law surviving him, to-wit: Mary Ann Stillions, a daughter, who intermarried with one Frank Stillions. She died on or about the 16th of April, 1916; Elizabeth Harp, a daughter, who intermarried with Lawson Harp, both of whom are dead, but left surviving them a daughter, Laura Leatherman, who intermarried with one William H. Leatherman. They reside in Hagerstown, Washington County, Maryland. Joshua Michael, a son, whose wife's name was Fannie Michael, both of whom are dead, but left surviving them a daughter, Minnie Day, who intermarried with one Charles Day, and who live in West Lebanon, Indiana. Lavinia Grumbine, another daughter, who has since died, leaving surviving her a son, Isaac Grumbine, whose wife's name is Alma Grumbine, and who live in Highfield, Washington County, Maryland; William Grumbine, a son, whose wife's name is \_\_\_\_\_ Grumbine, and who live in Westminster, Carroll County, Maryland; Daisy Grumbine, Gorin, another daughter, who intermarried with one \_\_\_\_\_ Gorin, and who live in Claude, Texas; Carrie Grumbine, another daughter of Lavinia Grumbine, who is unmarried, and who lived in the City of Richmond, Virginia; Minnie Grumbine, a daughter, who first intermarried with one Clinton Koogle, who subsequently died without issue, the
