

Joseph C.D.Harris and his wife Rachel, during their joint lives and the life of the survivor of them; and upon the death of said Joseph C.D.Harris and his said wife, then to hold the same in like trust for the benefit of their children, Ada Harris, Emma Harris, Nellie Harris and Alonze Harris until the youngest of said children should arrive at the age of twenty one years, and then said trust should immediately cease and said cause should become the property of said Ada, Emma, Nellie and Alonze Harris absolutely, That said Joseph C.D.Harris and his said wife are both dead and said Ada Harris, Emma Harris, Nellie Harris and Alonze Harris are all considerably more than twenty one years of age and said trust has terminated, and said Ada Harris now the wife of Earl M. Yates, said Emma Harris now the wife of Harry Williams, and said Nellie Harris whose full name was Rachel Eleanor Harris and now the wife of James P. Harris, and who with their said husbands are Plaintiffs in this case, together with said Alonze Harris, now married, now own said real estate as tenants in common each being the owner of an undivided one fourth thereof, That said land cannot be divided among said tenants in common without less or injury to the parties in interest.

That said James P. Harris obtained a judgment against said Alonze Harris in the Circuit Court for Frederick County on the 21st day of March 1914, for the sum of one hundred and ten dollars with interest and costs and which said Judgment is a lien upon the interest of said Alonze Harris in said real estate, and said James P. Harris entitled to have his interest as lienor protectia in the distribution of the proceeds of sale. The bill alleges that the Plaintiffs Ada M. Yates and Earl W. Yates her husband are both residents of the District of Columbia, the Plaintiffs Emma S. Williams and Harry Williams, her husband are both residents of Baltimore City in the State of Maryland and the Plaintiff, Rachel Eleanor Harris and James P. Harris her husband are both residents of Frederick County and the said Alonze Harris, the defendant is a non resident of the State of Maryland, whose whereabouts in unknown to the Plaintiffs, but when last heard from by them was a resident of the City of San Francisco in the State of California,

The Bill prays for a sale of said real estate by a decree of said Honorable Court and a division of the money arising from said sale among the parties entitled thereto according to their respective rights.

The Bill also prays for an order of publication against said Alonze Harris, who is an adult and a non resident of the State of Maryland and whose present whereabouts is unknown to the Plaintiffs but who, when last heard from was a resident of the City of San Francisco, stating the substance and object of said Bill of Complaint and warning him to be and appear in said Court on or before a certain day to be named in such order and show cause why the relief prayed should not be granted.

It is therefore adjudged and ordered that the Plaintiffs by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in some newspaper published in Frederick County, once in each of four successive weeks before the 2nd day of November A.D. 1918, give notice to the said non resident defendant, Alonze Harris, of the object and substance of said Bill, and warn him to appear in this Court in person or by Solicitor, on or before the 18th day of November A.D. 1918, and show cause why the relief prayed should not be granted.

Order of Publication No. 9852 Equity.

In the Circuit Court for Frederick County, sitting as a Court of Equity. Ada M. Yates and Earl W. Yates, her husband, and others vs. Alonze Harris and James P. Harris, Judgment Lienor.

The object of the bill in this case is to obtain a decree for the sale of a tract of land in Frederick County, Maryland, containing thirty acres and nine perches, more or less, of which Zachariah G. Harris, late of Frederick County, died seized and possessed, fully described in Exhibit 1 and 2 filed with the Bill of Complaint. The Bill states that said Zachariah G. Harris by a codicil to his last will and testament devised said thirty acres and nine perches of land, described in Exhibit No 2 filed with said bill to John P. Harris in trust for the use and benefit of Joseph C.D. Harris and his wife Rachel during their joint lives and the life of the survivor of them; and upon the death of said Joseph C.D. Harris and his said wife then to hold the same in like trust for the benefit of their children, Ada Harris, Emma Harris, Nellie Harris and Alonze Harris, until the youngest of said children should arrive at the age of twenty one years, and then said trust should immediately cease and said lands shall become the property of said Ada, Emma, Nellie and Alonze Harris, absolutely. That said Joseph C.D. Harris and his said wife are both dead and said Ada Harris, Emma Harris, Nellie Harris and Alonze Harris are all considerably more than twenty-one years of age and said trust had terminated, and said Ada Harris now the wife of Earl W. Yates, said Emma Harris now the wife of Harry Williams, and said Nellie Harris, whose full name was Rachel Eleanor Harris, and now the wife of James P. Harris, and who with their said husbands are Plaintiffs in this case, together with
