the Bill; that the said James W. Corbett left surviving him a widow, Mary A. Corbett, who died November 6th, 1919, and the following children and grandchildren, William J. Corbett, unmarried, Harry W. Corbett, who is unmarried and whose wife's name is Helen Corbett, Mollie E. Gunther, the wife of William E. Gunther, Alma R. Huffmaster, the wife of E. Jesse Huffmaster, Thomas J. Corbett, who died, intestate, in January 1915, leaving a widow, Cora Corbett and three children, James W. Anna May and John W. Maggie A. who was twice married, and who died, intestate, December 28, 1918, leaving, as her survivors (both of her husbands being dead) three children, Chester E. Smith, a son by her first marriage, and Caroline E., a daughter by the first marriage, who is now the wife of Elty Virts, and Jerome Goodhart, a son by the second marriage; and Charles M. Corbett, unmarried; and the said William J. Corbett, Harry W. Corbett and Helen Corbett, his wife, Mollie E. Gunther and William E. Gunther, her husband, Alma R. Huffmaster and E. Jesse Huffmaster, her husband, Cora Corbett, widow, Chester E. Smith, Caroline E. Virts and Elty Virts, her husband, are all adults, and are the Plaintiffs in this suit; and Charles M. Corbett, adult, Jerome Goodhart, James W. Corbett, Anna May Corbett and John W. Corbett, infants, are all non-residents of the State of Maryland, the said Charles M. Corbett being a resident of Ohio, Jerome Goodhart a resident of Virginia, and James W. Corbett, Anna May Corbett and John W. Corbett, residents of Pennsylvania, and who are Defendants. The Bill further alleged that the said real estate cannot be divided among the parties in interest, without loss and injury, and that the sale of said property would be to the interest and advantage of all the parties.

It is therefore this 28th day of November, 1919, by the Circuit Court for Frederick County, in Equity, ORDERED that the Plaintiffs, by causing a copy of this Order to be inserted in some newspaper published in Frederick County, once in each of four successive weeks before the 3rd day of January, 1920, give notice to the said non-resident Defendants of the object and substance of the Bill of Complaint, warning them, and each of them, to appear in this Court, in person or by Solicitor, on or before the 19th day of January 1920, to show cause, if any they have, why a decree should not be passed as prayed.
