

- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Who was Margaret Embly?
- A. My great-grandmother, the mother of -1 Ann Sophia.
- Q. You knew your grandmother, didn't you?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. How old are you?
- A. Forty-four.
- Q. Was your-grandmother Margaret Embly married more than once?
- A. Married the second time to Lewis Young.
- Q. The first time she was married to David Embly?
- A. Correct.
- Q. Your grandmother Ann Sophia, was she the only daughter of David Embly?
- A. To the best of my knowledge.
- Q. She survived her mother Margaret Young, isn't that right?
- A. That's right, she survived her mother Margaret Young.
- Q. Your grandmother's will bears date February 11, 1893?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. At that time what, if any, improvements were on this lot No. 28?
- A. Not No. 28, the improvements were a two-story brick house occupying eighteen feet of the lot, and a weatherboarded log house termed as a double house because of two entrances, occupying twenty-four and a half feet of it.
- Q. (Court) That a dwelling house?
- A. Dwelling house and store. It wasn't two houses. It was a dwelling house and store.
- Q. The one was log constructed?
- A. Of log and weatherboarding construction. It was considered two houses because there was a room for the dwelling house and later made into a store.
- Q. (Mr. Weinberg) That log house fronted on West Patrick Street?
- A. The log house fronted on West Patrick Street the same as the brick, and they were both adjoining, one against the other.
- Q. Separate walls?
- A. Separate walls,
- Q. When did your grandmother Ann Sophia Paisley die?
- A. January, 1899.
- Q. Was that the same condition at the time of her death?
- A. Same condition at the time of her death, right.
- Q. Was there any change in the physical condition after her death?
- A. Yes, in June, 1905, my father removed the log and weatherboarded house and made a lawn, filled in the cellar and made a lawn. It's been that way since.
- Q. You have measured this lot?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What is the frontage of it?
- A. Forty-two and a half.
- Q. And the frontage part occupied by the log house--
- A. Was twenty-four and a half and the other eighteen.
- Q. After your father's death did you and your brother borrow any money?
- A. Borrowed \$1,000 from the Frederick Building Association to improve the two-story brick house.
- Q. And that is the mortgage that is on record here in Liber 371, Folio 64?
- A. That's correct.
- Q. Now your mother also signed that mortgage?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. You know why?
