

- Q. Who used the lot?
- A. The tenants used it.
- Q. The tenants in the log house?
- A. The tenants in the log house used the western portion as ground for planting of flowers.
- Q. Garden?
- A. Garden and flowers.
- Q. How deep is the lot?
- A. 264 feet. It joins the school lot.
- Q. Who lived in the brick house at that time?
- A. My grandmother, My father was dead at that time.
- Q. Did your father live there at that time?
- A. No, he was married and away.
- Q. She lived there alone?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What portion of the lot did your grandmother use?
- A. She used half of the lot. The lot was divided by a path directly in the center, and she used the eastern portion and the tenant used the western portion at that time.
- Q. Did that path then run to the rear of the log house?
- A. No, it ran to the rear of the brick house, because the brick house was a longer house, may be twenty or thirty feet longer than the log house.
- Q. Then the path instead of dividing the lot in half, there was on the east side of the path about eighteen feet and the balance of the lot was on the west side?
- A. No, it was divided as near as I can remember directly in the middle, but from the end of the brick house there was merely a flagstone pavement that was used by either the tenant or my grandmother used it. There was no division there at all.
- Q. No dividing fence?
- A. No dividing fence. The two yards were together, and my father said it was that way as far as he could remember.
- Q. Was there a privy back there at the end of the lot when you remembered it?
- A. Yes, that was on the western part.
- Q. There as an outside closet that stood on the western portion of the lot?
- A. That was used by the occupants of both houses at that time, at the time my grandfather made her will.
- Q. Was there any change in the property in that respect prior to your grandmother's death?
- A. No, sir, that remained till my father moved in the house and tore it down, and then it became the one piece of land there.
- Q. (Mr. Weinberg) After your grandmother's death your father took possession of the brick house?
- A. After my grandmother's death my father took possession of the property and lived there. He tore down the log and weatherboarded house and made a brick house, and the ground became part of the brick house. My father used both the east and western half for a garden.
- Q. And that log house and storeroom were rented by your grandmother to the time of her death?
- A. To the time of her death.
- Q. (Court) Just how far west of College Avenue is that?
- A. Just on top the hill near to Main's Blacksmith shop. It's quite a vacant place there. There is six or seven feet and then another alley to the house above it. It is about fifty two feet from one house to the other now, including the driveway.
- Q. You mean from this brick house to the Main property?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Where the blacksmith shop stood are now three houses?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Did your grandmother at the time she occupied this brick dwelling use the western portion of the lot for any purpose at all?
- A. None to the best of my knowledge. It was used by the tenants. As long as I remember there was tenants in this house.
- Q. Well the log house was older than the brick house?
