

August, 1918, In 1926 she married Moses C. Allbright and they lived in Washington City, where she died on August 21, 1928, At the time of her death she owned a house and lot in Brunswick which is described in the deed from William P. Deavers and wife to Jesse Lee Wood and Donna Mae Wood, dated May 26, 1914. She left surviving her her widower, Moses C. Allbright, a resident of Washington City, and two infant children, namely; Virginia Wood, and infant, aged 14 years, a daughter of her first husband, and Patricia Allbright, an infant daughter of her second husband, aged about 18 months. Both of said infants have been making their home with their relatives, spending most of the time in Martisburg, West Virginia, frequently coming to Brunswick, Maryland, for short stays. There is no guardian appointed for them in this State. This property is worth about \$1800.00.

Donna Mae Allbright left a little personal property, which is in Washington City, and no administration has been granted on her estate that I know of. At the time of her death Mrs. Allbright was indebted to several people, including myself. In 1924, I paid a note for her at the Peoples National Bank and took an assignment of a judgment for \$700.00 which the Bank held at that time. I produced to you the note she gave me and the certified copy of the judgment, duly assigned to me. When I took up this debt at the Peoples National Bank, duly assigned to me. When I took up this debt at the Peoples National Bank I advanced \$484.04, which is still due me with interest, amounting at that time to \$578.61. My cousin, Ezra C. Barker, and I were on the note of Mrs. Wood to the Bank of Brunswick, which I took up and paid the Bank; the amount due on the note at the time of her death, \$80.00, with interest from that date, and I file herewith the note.

Mrs Allbright died without leaving sufficient personal property to pay all her debts, funeral expenses and costs of administration. The personal estate was considered so small that no administration was granted, to my knowledge.

To the General Interrogatory;

That is all I know, excepting I have heard that Mr. Allbright has at his home in Washington City some household furniture which belonged to her, and three rings.

Mr. Ezra C. Barker, a witness of lawful age, produced on the part of the Plaintiff, being duly sworn by the Plaintiff, deposes and says; My name is Ezra C. Barker, I reside in Brunswick, Frederick County, I am a second cousin of the former Mrs. Allbright. From the death of her first husband until she married Moses C. Allbright I was associated in business in Brunswick with her and transacted most of her business. We ran a store for general merchandise.

Mrs. Allbright died in August, 1928, and left surviving her her two infant daughters; Virginia Wood and Patricia Allbright, and her former husband Moses C. Allbright. They were living in Washington City at the time of her death. She owned a house and lot in Brunswick which she bought from William P. Deavers and wife and which is worth about \$1800.00.

I was a joint maker for her accommodation of a note for \$100.00 to the Bank of Brunswick on which she paid \$20.00 and the interest. I look at the note marked Exhibit "B" now handed me and that is the note which I have mentioned, and I am advised that Mr. William M. Barker paid the Bank. I look at the note marked Exhibit "A" and recognize the signature of the maker as that of Mrs Allbright, whose name at the date of the note was "Wood". It was signed when she was still Mrs. Wood. I understood that William M. Barker loaned Mrs. Wood \$484.04, to pay her note at the Peoples National Bank in Brunswick.

I know that Mrs. Allbright had some personal property in Washington and three rings, but I know of no administration being granted on her estate, either here or in Washington. I do not think she left personal estate sufficient to pay her debts and administration expenses. She left no personal estate in the State of Maryland.

To the General Interrogatory. No sir, that is about all. Ezra C. Barker.
