

Lottie Gardner, William Gardner, John Duppins, Edna Duppins, Alice Duppins, William Duppins, Mazie Duppins, <sup>are</sup> all residents of Frederick County, Maryland: Annie Brown and Philemon Brown, are residents of Baltimore County, Maryland: Clarence Duppins, Maggie Duppins, and Ella Richardson are residents of Baltimore City, Maryland; and James Duppins, Gertie Duppins, Olivia Dixon, Bates Dixon, Perry Richardson, Annie May Richardson, William Richardson, Norman Richardson, Margaret Waters and <sup>M.</sup> Waters, her husband, are all non-residents of the State of Maryland, but live in Pittsburgh, the State of Pennsylvania. I think the property which was left by my Uncle Charles G. Richardson, in value, is worth from Three Hundred to Four Hundred Dollars. There was no administration on the estate. There is due unto the Plaintiffs in this case, L. Cramer Powell and Irving S. Albaugh, partners trading as "Powell and Albaugh", of Libertytown, Maryland, the sum of Ninety Dollars, for necessary funeral expenses, and I now look at Exhibit "B", and believe the same, which is a bill, is correct and should be paid; and I know that my Uncle was indebted to Mr. M. Dorsey Norris, the other Plaintiff in this cause, on a Note under seal, dated January seventh, 1929, in amount, Thirty-four Dollars, as Principal with interest from date, and in looking at said Exhibit I hereby testify that that is the signature of my Uncle, Charles G. Richardson, on said note, <sup>the same has not been paid and is due and owing to Mr Norris,</sup> and in his hand writing. I do not know of any other debts of my Uncle, Charles G. Richardson, I would say that this property should be sold by a Trustee, to be appointed by the Court, and after the payment of all expenses, and amounts due, to Messrs. Powell and Albaugh, and Mr. <sup>M.</sup> Dorsey Norris, that the residue shall be divided in accordance with the provisions of law, among the heirs-at-law, or to those entitled to receive it.

IRVING S. ALBAUGH, witness of lawful age, produced on the part of the Plaintiffs, being first duly sworn, and examined viva voce, deposes and says as follows:

My name is IRVING S. ALBAUGH, I am fifty-five years of age, I reside at Libertytown, Maryland, and am a partner with Mr. L. Cramer Powell, We trade as "Powell and Albaugh", and we are Plaintiffs in this cause. We are Funeral Directors in Libertytown, Maryland, and as such we officiated at the funeral of Charles G. Richardson, who died at Old Fields, Frederick County, Maryland, on or about the seventeenth day of June, 1929, There is due to us, as Funeral Directors the sum of Ninety Dollars, as stated in the account filed in this cause, marked "Exhibit "B" I, too, know the property of which Charles G. Richardson died seized and possessed. It consists of a parcel of land, improved <sup>by</sup> a two story weather boarded dwelling house, with a metal roof, and in fair condition. IT is located in Liganore District, and is where Mr. Richardson lived at the time of his death. It is worth between Three and Four Hundred Dollars. Charles G. Richardson at the time of his decease had no personal property of any kind.

M. DORSEY NORRIS, a witness of lawful age, produced on the part of the Plaintiffs, being first duly sworn and examined viva voce, deposes and saus as fdlo ws:

My name is M. Dorsey Norris, I am forty-three years of age, and reside at Libertytown, Maryland. I am one of the Plaintiffs to this case. I knew Charles G. Richardson in his lifetime. He died intestate, seized and possessed of a lot of land, improved by a dwelling house, in Liganore District, Frederick County, Maryland. Mr. Richardson was a widower at the time of his death, and left no children nor descendants of any children. He was indebted to me in the sum of Thirty-four Dollars, at the time of his decease, by a Single Bill dated January seventh 1929, filed in this cause, as Exhibit "C". He never paid anything on it, and the money is still due and owing. He has no personal property, except some household furniture of very small value. There was no administration on the estate, I loaned him the money, which is the consideration of
