

(2) That the said George G. Lambert by his aforesaid last will and testament, after making other provisions, devised and bequeathed as follows:

"I give, devise and bequeath to my dear wife, Belinda A. Lambert, all of my estate, real, personal and mixed, wherever situated, or found, during her natural life and without bond or security, and at her death I give, devise and bequeath said whole estate to my daughter Eva F. Stitely, during her natural life, and the death of my said daughter, I devise and bequeath the said estate to her heirs at law forever, excepting, however, One Thousand Dollars, which I give and bequeath to her husband, namely, Joseph E. Stitely, provided he outlives my said daughter, but should my said daughter die after coming into possession of said legacy, or before coming in possession thereof, leaving no child or children living, or the descendant of a child or children living, then I revoke all the above devises except to my said wife and said son in law (if he becomes entitled to said legacy under the provisions aforesaid) and give devise and bequeath my said estate, after the death of my said wife to her and my own heirs at law forever equally."

(3) That the farm of the said George G. Lambert, whose name is sometimes written George Lampert and sometimes written as George Lambert, and which is located partly in Carroll County and partly in Frederick County, in the State of Maryland, in New Windsor District, was obtained by a deed dated March 1, 1888 from David P. Smelser, Mortgagee, et al., recorded among the Land Records of Carroll County, in Liber _____, No. 67, Folio 292 etc., containing one hundred eighty five and one half acres (185- $\frac{1}{2}$) acres of land, more or less, which is all of the real estate of which the said George G. Lambert died seized and possessed in Carroll County, Maryland, and included in the said farm totaling 185- $\frac{1}{2}$ acres is a portion of the land, which is unimproved, on the Frederick County side of the line, about eight to ten acres, which is included in the original deed, which deed has been recorded both in Carroll County, Maryland, in Liber No. 67, Folio 292 etc. as shown by Exhibit No. 2, as well as in Frederick County, Maryland, as shown by a certified copy of the deed of record in that Court marked Exhibit #3.

(4) That the estate of the said George G. Lambert was dully administered in the Orphans' Court for Carroll County and all debts paid, as shown by a certified copy of the administration account filed on or about the 1st day of April, 1912, by Belinda A. Lambert, Executrix, marked Exhibit No. 4 and prayed to be taken as a part of this Bill of Complaint, see Admr. Accts. W. A. No. 23 f. 247 &c.

(5) That the said Belinda A. Lambert, the widow of the late George G. Lambert, died intestate on or about April, 1929, in Carroll County, Maryland and her estate is fully administered in the Orphans' Court of Carroll County and all debts paid as shown by a certified copy of the Administration account filed by your complainant, Eva F. Stitely, Administratrix, marked Exhibit No. 5 and prayed to be taken as a part of this bill of Complaint.

(6) That the said Joseph E. Stitely, husband of your complainant, is yet living on said farm with your complainants, in Carroll County, in the State of Maryland and that your complaint and her said husband have only one daughter, namely, Agnes M. Wolfe, who is an adult about the age of twenty one years, intermarried with Percy C. Wolfe, her husband, and who lives at McKinstry's Mills, in Carroll County, in the State of Maryland and your petitioner and her said husband Joseph E. Stitely, have also an adopted son, namely, George William Stitely, who was eighteen years of age May 22,
