

Q Did your mother die without exercising that power?

A Yes, sir, she did.

Q About how long did she die after the death of your father?

A About three months.

Q Name the children, together with the husbands of those who are married, and state where they now reside.

A Myself and wife Helen Allnutt, and we reside in Camp Hill, Pennsylvania; Mary Allnutt, married Martin J. Logan, and they reside in Providence, Rhode Island; Elizabeth Allnutt, resides in Pensacola, Florida. She is unmarried and a Sister of Charity. Georgia Allnutt, married Dr. Raymond Oyler, Biglerville, Pa., and they reside at Biglerville. Catherine Allnutt, who resides in Camp Hill and is single. She resides with me. Frances Estelle Allnutt, who resides at St. Joseph's College, Emmitsburg, Frederick County, Maryland. Her residence at this time is at St. Joseph's. She is a student there.

Q Now I show you Exhibit Deed which describes a farm which was conveyed to your father by Richard S. J. Dutrow and others, and ask you whether this deed properly describes the real estate which your father owned at the time of his death?

A Yes, sir.

Q About how many acres are in the property?

A About 187 acres - 186 plus.

Q State how that property is improved.

A It has a nine-room frame dwelling house and a barn - about an 80-foot barn I think it is a tenant house, corn-house and other outbuildings.

Q I now show you this Exhibit Contract of Sale dated November 18, 1938, by the adult heirs of George S. Allnutt and William T. Allnutt as next friend and for and on behalf of Frances E. Allnutt, Infant, and Parsons Newman, whereby the farm of George S. Allnutt is contracted to be sold for \$3,000, subject to the mortgage of the Citizens National Bank, in the amount of \$12,500, and ask you to say whether or not you think that it is to the benefit and advantage of the infant that the contract be ratified?

A I do.

Q Are all of your sisters of age?

A All but Frances E. who is nineteen years of age.

Q Why do you feel it would be of benefit and advantage to your infant sister Frances that the sale be ratified?

A I think it is a very fair price, and all that we have been able to get. I have endeavored to sell it since my father's death, and advertised it in the papers and put it in the real estate agents' hands, and haven't been able to sell it.

Q State whether in your judgment the farm can be divided between the parties entitled thereto, without loss or injury?

A No, sir.

Q Who were the Executors named in the will of your father?

A My mother and I have been appointed Executors.

Q You are now the surviving executor of your father's estate?

A That's right.

Q I now hand you Exhibit Mortgage filed with the bill of complaint in this case, and ask you whether this mortgage is still outstanding and due and owing to the Citizens National Bank of Frederick.

A It is.

Q In addition to that mortgage, was your father indebted to the Citizens Bank on other notes?

A He was. One for \$1900 and one for \$1175. In addition to that there was a \$600 note, but
