

Q. Did she leave any children?

A. She is dead and left a son, William Thompson. Her husband is living and he has remarried. His name is Fielder Thompson, and he lives at Jefferson, Maryland.

Q. When did she die?

A. She died about nine years ago.

Q. Are there any other children of Hanson Thompson?

A. Yes, Philip Thompson.

Q. Did he leave any children?

A. Yes, one son, Marlowe.

Q. Is Philip Thompson's wife living?

A. Yes, she is living and is remarried, and her husband's name is Walter Axline, and they live in Brunswick.

Q. Do you know what property Hanson Thompson owned in Brunswick?

A. He owned the home place on Ninth Avenue and a vacant lot on E Street.

Q. Look at these two deeds, each from The Real Estate Mortgage & Investment Company, one dated July 24, 1890, and the other dated March 6, 1918. Do they describe the real estate owned by Mr. Thompson, one lot located on Ninth Street and one on E. Street? (Certified copy of deeds filed with the Bill of Complaint, marked Exhibits Nos. 3 and 4 to the Bill of Complaint, offered in evidence.)

A. Yes, sir.

Q. State whether or not Hanson M. Thompson at the time of his death owned any property other than real estate.

A. He owned nothing. He had no furniture or bank accounts, and really had no estate except this real estate, which I understand is heavily mortgaged.

Q. Do you know whether or not letters of administration were granted on his estate in the Orphans Court?

A. I am sure that none were ever granted because he had no estate.

Q. When did Mrs. Emma Thompson die?

A. She died in October, 1935.

Q. How old was Mrs. Thompson when she died?

A. She was seventy-six.

Q. How old was Mr. Thompson when he died?

A. He was eighty-two.

Q. Were either of them ever married other than this marriage?

A. Neither were ever married other than this marriage.

Q. Do you know, or can you state, any other matter or thing which may be of benefit or advantage to the parties to this cause, or either of them, or that may be material to the subject of this your examination, or the matters in question between the parties?

A. I have nothing further to add.
