

Q: At the time of your father's death, Mrs. Forrest, will you state who he left surviving him?

A: At the time of my father's death, he left surviving him my mother, Annie E. Thompson, who died one year later to the day, on the 24th day of October, 1941. I had an older sister, Katie, who was married to Russell Carr, and who died before my father on or about the 9th day of January, 1925. My sister left two daughters surviving her---Virginia, who is married and whose husband's name is Paul Copenhaver. My niece, Virginia, and her husband live at Martinsburg, West Virginia. The other daughter was Betty Lee Carr, who is an infant between 18 and 19 years of age, and who is staying with her father's mother in Hedgesville, West Virginia. From time to time she has visited me, and she was staying with me about the time of the filing of the Bill in this cause. Of course, I am a daughter of James H. Thompson, and the ones I have mentioned and myself constitute all the heirs-at-law of my father, James H. Thompson.

Q: At the time of your father's death, Mrs. Forrest, were there any liens against the property we have been talking about?

A: Yes. There was one judgment in favor of the Peoples National Bank in Brunswick. It was originally in the amount of \$898.63, but was substantially reduced. I talked with Mr. Grubbs, the Cashier of the Bank sometime ago, and he said the balance now is \$473.00.

Q: Mrs. Forrest, I hand you Exhibit III. Will you state what it is?

A: It is a certified copy of judgment against James H. Thompson and Annie E. Thompson, my father and mother, and in favor of the Peoples National Bank in Brunswick; and this is the only lien against the property of which my father died seized and possessed.

Q: Mrs. Forrest, is the property we have been talking about occupied or is it vacant at the present time?

A: The property is vacant, and in its present condition it is depreciating in value.

Q: In your judgment, can the property be divided among the parties entitled thereto without loss and injury?

A: No. In my judgment, it cannot. I think it would be to the best interests of everybody concerned that the property be sold under a decree of court and the proceeds from the sale divided among the parties entitled according to their respective interests.

THEODORE C. FORREST, a witness of lawful age, one of the Plaintiffs herein, produced on the part of himself, after having been duly sworn, deposes and says as follows:

Q: State your name, age and residence, Mr. Forrest.

A: My name is Theodore C. Forrest. I am 34 years of age and I live with my wife, Thelma, who has just testified, at 828 East A Street, in Brunswick, Maryland.

Q: Mr. Forrest, you are the husband of Thelma C. Forrest and one of the Plaintiffs in this cause, are you not?

A: Yes, sir.

Q: Do you know all the parties defendant to this cause?

A: Yes. Virginia Copenhaver is my wife's niece, and she lives with her husband, Paul Copenhaver, in Martinsburg, West Virginia; and Betty Lee Carr is also the niece of my wife.

Q: How long have you been married to your wife, Mr. Forrest?

A: We have been married almost 16 years and we have always lived in Brunswick.

Q: Of course you knew James H. Thompson in his lifetime?

A: Yes, I did.
