

Q: Do you request that these exhibits be introduced into evidence in this cause?

A: Yes, I do.

Q: Of what did the real estate of which Charles F. Rothenhoefer died seized and possessed consist?

A: It consisted of a two story frame house and a brick two story dairy building from which he operated his business of selling milk, located adjacent to the house on East Seventh Street, in Frederick City, Maryland.

Q: Is this all of the real estate of which Charles F. Rothenhoefer died seized and possessed?

A: Yes, it is so far as I know. I know of no other.

Q: Did Charles F. Rothenhoefer leave a will, and if so, has it been duly admitted to probate in the Orphans Court of Frederick County?

A: Yes, it has.

Q: I now hand you an exhibit marked "Will". Do you ask that this exhibit be introduced as evidence in this cause?

A: Yes, I do.

Q: Under the terms of the Last Will and Testament of Charles F. Rothenhoefer who was his executrix and has she duly qualified as such?

A: His executrix was Annie Rothenhoefer and she has duly qualified.

Q: Who are the beneficiaries under the will of Charles F. Rothenhoefer, deceased, and are they all joined as parties in this Bill of Complaint?

A: By the second paragraph my brother, Roger, is given One Hundred Dollars and my mother, Annie Rothenhoefer, is given a life estate in all of my father's property. In the fifth paragraph after the death of my mother he divides the estate in one-fourth parts between his four children. Ruth Heims, whose husband's name is Martin Heims, was given one-fourth. They reside in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Mary Jones, whose husband's name is G. Arthur Jones, is given one-fourth and they reside in Frederick, Maryland. I, Pauline Koontz, am a widow and am given one-fourth and I reside in Frederick, Maryland. My brother, Edgar Rothenhoefer, who is unmarried, and who resides in Thurmont, Maryland, is also given a one-fourth. My brother, Roger, is divorced. All of the parties mentioned in the fifth paragraph are living as well as my mother, Annie Rothenhoefer, who is given a life interest in my father's estate. In the seventh paragraph of the will in the event any of those in paragraph five die before my mother, Annie, with children, then their children are to share their estate. Ruth Heims and her husband have two children, who are both minors, and whose names are Marilyn and Eleanor Heims. Mary Jones and her husband have six children, Pauline Bowlus, whose husband's name is Richard Bowlus, and who is of age; Louise Strine, whose husband's name is Paul Strine, and who is of age; Marianna Legore, whose husband's name is Ralston Legore, who is of age; and the following minor children who are unmarried, Helen Jones, Marie Jones and Nancy Jones. All of the children of Mary Jones reside in Frederick County. I, Pauline Koontz have an adult daughter, Betty Rogers, whose husband's name is John Rogers, who resides in Frederick City, Maryland. My brother, C. Roger Rothenhoefer, has two adult children, Roger Rothenhoefer, whose wife's name is Betty, and who resides at Thurmont, Maryland; and Elaine Nelms, whose husband's name is Ralph Nelms, who resides in Oklahoma. My brother Edgar has no children. These are all the parties mentioned in the will, as well as those who might share under the will by the death of any one of my brothers or sisters or myself in paragraph of the will.

Q: Have they all filed answers to the Bill of Complaint?

A: Yes, they have.
