"EXHIBIT B"

We, Susan W. Wenner and Virginia R. Wenner being of sound mind and body, make jointly and severally our last Will and Testament. The surviving one to receive and have possession of all property and manage the same as when both held it, and at the death of the last survivor,

We give and bequeath to our nephew H. Hampton Wenner the two fields part of the farm on which we live adjoining George A. Wenner beginning at gate on road just outside of hog lot and running straight to next farm below. We give to our niece Mary L. Lanham the balance of the farm, together with house and buildings.

We give to nephews William Ashton Wenner, H. Hampton Wenner, Charles William Wenner, William Waltman Wenner and George Washington Wenner and our niece Susan Winifred Wenner and Mary L. Lanham the proceeds of two thirds of the lots lying in and adjacent to Brunswick, Md. as our executors hereinafter named finds it most advantaged to dispose of and our two thirds of a field on the Potomac river that our mother inherited from her father Jacob Waltman consisting of twenty five or six acres more or less, also two thirds of a wood lot on the Short Hill mountain consisting of seventeen acres more or less, together with all stocks and bonds we jointly and severally possess at the time of our death not otherwise disposed of after our funeral expenses and the legacies are paid out, to be equally divided among our forementioned nephews and nieces share and share alike.

All the other household furniture (not elsewhere mentioned) together with horses, cattle and the rest of the stock and belongings to the place to be sold and divided among our nephews and two nieces afore mentioned, share and share alike.

We give to our niece Susan Winifred the two pitchers on parlor mantle and the silver ware.

We give to our nephew Charles W. the silver water pitcher and the two cut glass and silver pickle stands.

We give our great niece Florence the cut glass dish given us by her father.

We give to our great niece Mary Frazier the oil painting "Owls head mountain".

We give to our great niece Susan Virginia half doz. silver table spoons, half doz. teaspoons and half doz. desert spoons all not marked, 2 silver salt sellers marked Ginnie, 2 silver salt spoons marked C.W. and the sugar tongs marked C.W.

We give to our niece Mary L. Lanham the half doz. pearl handle knives and forks, one Haviland china, our mothers old green china tea set, the mahogany table in parlor, the mahogany dining table, half doz. silver table spoons, marked W.W. & S.W. the dozen desert spoons marked
