TO THE HONORABLE, THE JUDGES OF SAID COURT:

The above cause being at issue and a notice having been given to me by the Solicitors for the Plaintiffs of a desire to take testimony in the above entitled cause, I C. Clifton Virts, one of the standing Examiners of the Circuit Court for Frederick County, having been duly qualified and sworn as such, met at the law office of William M. Storm, Solicitor for the Plaintiffs, on Wednesday, November 21, 1945, at the hour of three o'clock, p.m. and then and there, in the presence of one of the Plaintiffs and his witness, and Solicitor for the Plaintiffs, proceeded to take the following testimony, that is to say:

Carl L. Shriner, a witness of lawful age, after having been duly sworn, deposes and says:

Will you state your name, age and residence?

Carl L. Shriner, I am thirty-four and reside at Thurmont, Maryland, Route 1.

Mr. Shriner, you and others filed a Bill of Complaint for the sale of certain property?

That is right.

That property is what property?

It was the property of my mother, Fannie M. Shriner, who inherited it from her son, Annan C. Shriner, who died without a will.

I hand you a paper marked Exhibit No. 1. Will you identify that as the property?

That is the deed to the property.

Will you describe this property, Mr. Shriner?

It is a parcel of land containing two acres and twelve perches, improved with a five-room log house weatherboarded, and is located on the Apple's Church road, leading from Thurmont to the Emmitsburg State Road.
