

William H. Crum, a witness of lawful age, produced on the part of the plaintiffs, having been first duly sworn, deposes and says:

My name is William H. Crum. I have lived in Woodsboro all my life. I was born there. I am going into seventy-one years of age.

I knew Mrs. Mary S. Donsife in her lifetime.. We generally called her Susie. She has been dead a number of years. Her husband's name was Otho J. Donsife. He died several years ago. I have known the Donsife property, mentioned in these proceedings, as long as I can remember. When I was eleven years old we moved in that house and we lived there for one year, according to my best recollection. At the time that we lived in the property it was substantially the same as it is today, only a few repairs have been made on the property in the meantime. Especially do I remember the room to the south which I would say measures eight feet across the front and runs back the depth of the house, I should say sixteen or eighteen feet. That room has been on the house ever since I have known anything, and it was there when we lived there. At the time we lived in the house it was a double house and we lived in the north end, but I remember the family living in the south end and that room. I remember when Otho J. Donsife moved his family back to Woodsboro after an absence of several years. He moved into this property when he came back from Alberton, and moved his family into this property. This has been much more than twenty years ago, but I can not remember exactly as there was no particular reason why I should. At the time he moved back I helped to make repairs on this house. I worked at the carpenter trade in my young days and with other men worked on the repair of this house for Mr. Donsife. The lines of the lot are the same now as when I first knew it. They have built
