

Q He told you about that judgment then? A. Yes.

Q All right, then what was done?

A Well, from there we went to I believe Mr. Kelly's office, who at that time was in connection with the closing up of the bank's business of the Commercial Bank, which held the judgment against Mr. Grayson Stull at the time, to see them about whether it would be possible to get him to release their claim against my father.

Q Well, did he do that?

A And he said they had some sales pending on the property, that is, the home property where Mr. Stull lived.

Q That is, Mr. Grayson Stull?

A Mr. Grayson Stull. And that was to be sold or was sold, and it was sold through the Government and that would be straightened up pretty soon, and he thought when that got cleared up they would clear the rest of it.

Q Then after that conversation was anything more said about the deed?

A Well, he said he didn't want to give him a deed that wasn't clear, and he said as soon as they would straighten it up they would give him a clear deed, and then he would pay for it. He was willing to pay for it then, that is, Guy was ready to pay for it, all he needed was a clear deed.

Q Did you ever have any other conversations with your father about the farm transaction after that?

A No more than he said Guy was going there and taking it over as his own, and as soon as he got it straightened up he would go ahead and make the settlement.

Q Your father died when? A. In September, 1941.

Q The same year in which the transaction took place about the farm? A. Yes.

Q Do you know whether your brother Guy did take charge of
