A Well, he didn't want me to have it unless it was clear cut.

Q Didn't your father tell you the farm was worth \$12,000, if you wanted the farm you would have to pay this judgment or assume the judgment? A. He did not.

Q Didn't say anything like that to you? A. No, sir.

Q Who was to pay this judgment?

A Well it really should be my uncle, don't you think?

Q Oh yes. Was there an understanding your father was to pay this \$1700 out of this \$8,000 and sell you the farm for \$6300?

A No, nothing like that.

Q Didn't he ask you to assume this judgment?

A No, sir.

Q He did not? No question about that in your mind, Guy? Your father didn't say it was up to you to take care of that judg-
