Q What conversation did you hear between Guy and your husband?

A I wasn't in the room.

Q I mean at the time you were in the room?

A I didn't hear anything, only about selling the place.

Q That is what I mean; everything you heard between Guy and your husband?

A Well, Guy was to have the place - he would like for Guy to have the place as far as that goes, he was the only one cared about farming. The other boys didn't care about farming, but that's about all I heard. But then of course Daddy told me just the last time that we were talking about it, when the boys were in here the last day to see about it, about a week before he died, that was the first I knew what Daddy had asked Guy for the place, and he said he had asked him \$8,000. He said that was dirt cheap. He said, "The place is worth every cent of \$12,000." That is what Daddy told me that night, and he said Guy was not willing to stand the judgment against the place./

Q In the conversation between Guy and your husband?

A No, sir.

Q You were not consulted concerning the sale of this farm, were you?

Q Your husband died in September? A. 5th of September.

Q You are his widow? A. Yes.

Q Guy was a tenant on the farm before the first of April, 1941,
