Q. Can you state whether or not your interest is susceptible to partition in kind? In other words, can this house and two lots be divided amongst your father's heirs without loss or injury?

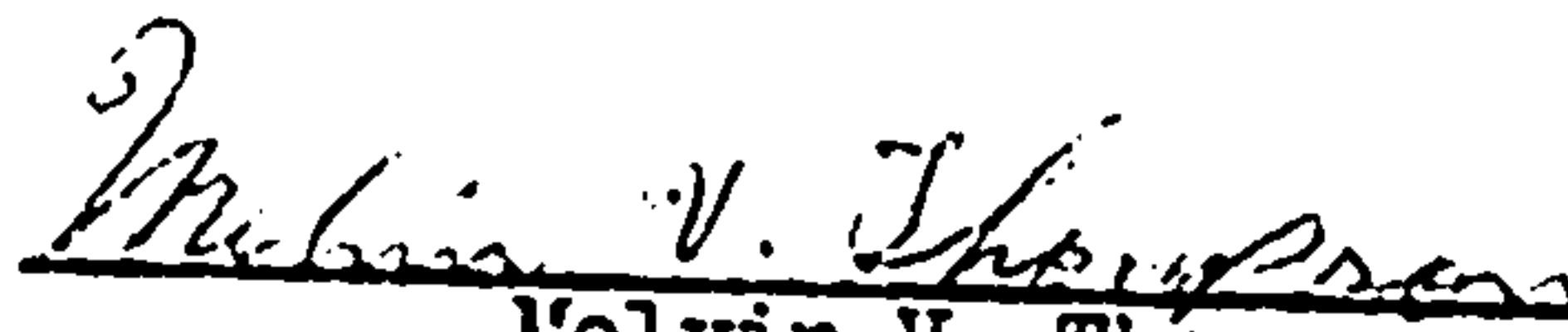
A. No, it cannot be divided without being sold, and the proceeds divided according to our interest in the property.
