

# CERTIFICATE OF SALE

I, James H. Falk, County Treasurer, Collector of Taxes for the State of Maryland and the County of Frederick, Maryland, hereby certify that on April 10<sup>th</sup>, 1950, I sold to George O. Bowman and Pansy Mae Bowman, his wife, at public auction for the sum of ten Dollars and 20 Cents, of which ten Dollars has been paid, the property located in Buckeystown District described as 1/4 acre of land, more or less and assessed to Sydney Russell

The property described herein is subject to redemption. Upon redemption the holder of this certificate will be refunded the sums paid on account of the purchase price together with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent per annum from the date of payment to the date of redemption, together with all other amounts specified by Chapter 761 of the Acts of 1948, and acts amendatory thereof. The balance due on account of the purchase price and all taxes, together with interest and penalties thereon, accruing subsequent to the date of sale, must be paid to the Collector before a deed can be delivered to the purchaser. After April 11<sup>th</sup>, 1951, a proceeding can be brought to foreclose all rights of redemption in the property. This certificate will be void unless such a proceeding is brought within two years from the date of this certificate.
