

Q I would like to refer to Equity Exhibits A and B filed in this case outlining the two deeds. Are you interested in acquiring your interest in that land - liquidating your interest in that land?

A I am, yes.

Q Is it subject to division by any other means than selling it?

A Yes.

Q I think you misunderstand me. Is it subject to any division other than by selling it? Can you divide it in any way?

A I wouldn't know how.

Q Would you describe the land? Is it improved?

A Well, it is $18\frac{3}{4}$ acres and has a 7-room house on it. He tore the stable and shed on each side down.

Q But the only improvement now is the 7-room house?

A Large woodshed and another small shed.

Q And it is your desire that the Court order that this property be sold and the proceeds divided between you and your brother?

A That's it.

Q Now, in addition to the 18-acre tract there is a 5-acre tract involved, is that not true?

A 25 acres of mountain land.

Q The two properties in question, the one containing 18 acres, 3 roods and 27 square perches, that was conveyed by Martin V. Easterday to yourself, Francis Easterday and your sister, Ada I. Easterday?

A Yes.

Q That was on November 28, 1899. That parcel of land contains $18\frac{3}{4}$ acres?

A Yes.

Q On the 21st of May, 1900, a parcel of land was conveyed to the same three parties containing $25\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land. That is the two properties in question.
