Q Could you say anything about the farm known as Urmont and the wood lot - what knowledge you have as to the probable value, or don't you care to express any opinion on that?

A I don't think I know enough to say.

Q Of course it goes without saying the farm or wood lot either couldn't be divided into the proportions necessary for a division, that is, one-fourth and three-eighths and three-sixteenths, without loss and injury to the persons entitled?

A I should think it couldn't be.
