

Q What would you say was the value of the farm?

A Well, I don't know.

Q Fair market value?

A I imagine \$12,000 would be a good price for it.

Q She has no other property that you know of?

A Not that I know of.

T. M. BLICKENSTAFF, recalled, deposes and says:

(The Court) Can you tell the Court anything about the crops from the farm - the income?

A Frankly, it is not fixed for dairying at all, and I don't think he's ever made more than a living off of it and paid the taxes. I don't think he's made any more than a living off of it. Unless you are fixed up for dairying--

Q You say a living; you mean for himself?

A That's right.

Q Does he give anything to his mother?

A No, nothing, but he kept the taxes and insurance up on the place, that's all.

Q Your mother doesn't realize anything from the farm?

A No, all she's had to live on is what cash she had.

Q (Mr. DeLauter) He did keep her for about ^{five} years?

A She lived with him for about five years, yes.

Q (The Court) But there is no cash income coming from the farm?

A No, the only thing they had was what they ate and their clothes and so on. They did keep that part of it going but he paid the taxes and insurance.

Q (Mr. DeLauter) Have you children discussed the appointment of a trustee?
