

Q When they applied for letters of administration?

A That's right.

Q After the letters of administration was a will produced alleged to be that of Charles L. W. Hildebrand, your half brother?

A That's right.

Q To that you filed a petition to caveat the will, did you not?

A That's right.

Q And a hearing was held in the Orphans' Court of Frederick County on that petition?

A Yes.

Q Did or not the Court pass an order in that case?

A Yes.

Q And the order provided that at the time he made this will he was incompetent, is that right?

A That's right.

MR. OFFUTT: I would like to offer into evidence a copy of the order of Court.

Q Mrs. Main, are all the heirs and next of kin that you have named adults?

A Yes.

Q Directing your attention to the real estate in these proceedings to be sold, would you state whether or not it can be divided, that is, partitioned, in kind, without material loss and injury to the parties in interest? In other words, can you divide it up in parts?

A It would have to be sold first.

Q And do you feel it would be to the best interests of all parties concerned that this real estate be sold and the proceeds divided among the parties of interest?

A That's right, yes.
