

Hagen, Harvey Hagen and June Hagen, all infants, residing in Washington City.

That said Addie Corum departed this life in 1937, and left surviving her no child or descendant but a surviving husband, George W. Corum, and said sisters, Ella Whitter and May Shaff, as her only heirs at law.

That said real estate is not susceptible of partition among the parties entitled to interest therein without material loss and injury, and it would be for the best interest and advantage of all the parties, especially the infant defendants, to have the real estate sold and the proceeds divided.

The bill then prays for a decree for the sale of said real estate; that a trustee or trustees be appointed to make such sale and for general relief.

It is thereupon, by the Circuit Court for Frederick County, Maryland, sitting in Equity and by the authority thereof, ordered this 9th day of December, 1937, that the Complainants by causing a copy of this order together with the substance and object of the bill of complaint to be inserted in some Newspaper published in said Frederick County, Maryland, once a week for four successive weeks before the 7th day of ~~December~~ January 1938, giving notice to the non-resident defendants, Vernon Hagen, Florence Hagen, Harvey Hagen and June Hagen, of the object and substance of this bill, warning them to be and appear in this Court in person or by solicitor, on or before the 24 day of January, 1938, to show cause, if any they have, why the decree ought not to be passed as prayed.
