WILLIAM L. JEFFERSON, a witness produced in behalf of the Defendants, being first duly sworn, deposes and says:

By Mr. E. C. Brown:

Q Will you state your full name, please?

A William Lawrence Jefferson.

Q Where do you live?

A 4507 B Street, S. E., Washington, D. C.

Q How old are you?

A 51 years old.

Q What was your relationship to William Joseph Proctor?

A That is what I got to explain. This is all new to me. I think he is supposed to be my great-grandfather, but as far as family affairs and distance, I was born in Washington and raised in New York, and the only close relatives that I know of is just my cousins that's here now, but my family in this part of Maryland I know nothing about. I have never seen my great-grandmother; never seen my great-grandfather on either side.

Q What is the relationship of your mother to William Joseph Proctor?

A My mother - she is married to Singleten Jefferson's son. I was the first grandchild in the family.

Q Are you related by affinity or consanguinity to William Joseph Proctor to any extent, to your knowledge, that is, on your mother side or father's side, by blood?

A Yes, I would be related on my father's side.
