- Q. This writing here is that your grandfather's handwriting or has this been put there recently?
- A. That's my mothers. My mother went through a series of pictures so we would know who was in these pictures.
- Q. This is part of your mother's estate that this property is being sold?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Can you tell us how long ago she wrote that on there?
- A. No, it is her handwriting, though. I would say sometime within the last ten years.
- Q. I believe you told me or just what did you say about your grandfather bringing in these flagstones. Is it your understanding he did or did not.
- A. He did not. The flagstones were there.
- Q. That is your understanding that the flagstones were already there.
- A. Yes.
- Q. You have no knowledge of your own about any of this, have you?
- A. No, I was born in 1916.
- Q. When this porch was torn off, was that torn off because of any dispute with the Roads Commission or the Roads people, or was it torn off because you desired to improve the property.
- A. Ever since I was old enough to identify a Georgian house, I wanted to take the porch off. My father died in '41, so in '46 I finally talked my mother into letting me remove the porch.
- Q. When the State Roads Commission made this narrow black top road that you first recall in front of the house and then later made it wider by adding shoulders. Can you tell us when those shoulders were added?
- A. It was either in the late 20's or early 30's. I think it was in the late 20's.
- Q. Within your recollection?
- A. Oh, yes. I can say this. With the stones there was another stone there in the T formation there was always some extra grass out there always space out therefor a car to park and not interfere with the road. That is how much space we had in front of the house.
- Q. When was that space narrowed?
- A. With the shoulders and after World War II with the widening of the road.
