Q. Do you know approximately when the last mentioned conveyance was made?

A. I think it was about April 1, 1939.

Q. Mrs. Gordon, I show you a certified copy of a deed filed in these proceedings as Exhibit "D", executed by Raymond C. Rice and Catherine Rice, his wife, to Dorsey L. Rice, Clyde E. Rice and Clarence C. Rice, dated April 1, 1939. Will you examine this deed, and state whether or not it is a true copy of the deed by which your brother, Raymond, conveyed his interest in the farm?

A. Yes.

(Exhibit "D" filed with the Examiner as evidence and so marked.)

Q. Upon the execution and delivery of the last mentioned deed, did you understand that the title to the home farm was then vested in your brothers, Dorsey, Clyde and Clarence, as tenants in common?

A. Yes.

Q. Are the last three named brothers now living?

A. No, sir.

Q. Will you name those that are deceased?

A. Clyde E. Rice and Clarence C. Rice.

Q. When did your brother, Clyde, die?

A. April 9, 1963.

Q. Did he die testate or intestate?

A. He died intestate.

Q. Was he married at the time of his death?

A. No.

Q. Will you name the persons whom your brother Clyde left surviving as his heirs-at-law?

A. He was survived by my brothers, Dorsey, Clarence, Walter, Raymond and myself. In addition, there are children of my deceased sister, Grace L. King.

Q. When did your sister, Grace, die?
