

- Q. In an effort to obtain payment of your account for funeral services, have you taken any action to administer the estate of the late Philip I. Fisher?
- A. Yes, I applied to the Orphans Court for Frederick County for letters of administration on the estate when none of the other members of the family took such action.
- Q. Mr. Gladhill, I show you a copy of letters of administration filed in these proceedings, as Exhibit "No. 3". Will you examine the same, and state whether or not that is a true copy of your appointment as Administrator of the Estate of Philip I. Fisher?
- A. It is.
Exhibit "No. 3" filed with the Examiner as evidence,
and so marked.
- Q. Mr. Gladhill, as Administrator of Mr. Fisher's Estate, has any personal property come into your hands?
- A. At the time of Mr. Fisher's death, I understand that he had a horse which was disposed of prior to my appointment as Administrator. I learned that the horse brought \$30.00 although this money has not as yet been paid over to me. The home in which Mr. Fisher lived contained only the most meager furnishings, which, for all practical purposes, should be classified as junk.
- Q. Do you know of the existence of any other personal property from which any value may be obtained for the payment of Mr. Fisher's creditors?
- A. No. At the time I went up to the property after my appointment as Administrator, there was nothing of value there whatsoever.
- Q. In addition to your unpaid account for funeral expenses, Mr. Gladhill, have any other obligations been presented to you by creditors of the decedent in this case?
- A. Yes, I have received a statement from Dr. Frank Damazo, Surgeon,
