

Q And does your wife have any cash now?

A Well, she's got property.

Q And about what is that worth?

A I consider it worth \$2300.

Q (The Court) That is a 2-story weatherboarded house?

A That's right.

Q And land with it? A. Oh, possibly an acre and a quarter.

Q Does she have any stocks and bonds?

A She's got a little stock in the Western Maryland.

Q Nothing other than that? A. No.

Q Does she have a bank account?

A She did have a bank account, yes. She had a bank account in the Walkersville Bank of about \$800 I think, and of course part of that is laying there, never been nobody to collect the payments. That is laying there.

Q That was in the old Walkersville Savings Bank?

A That's right, and I think it amounts to something like \$300. I found that out sometime ago.

Q (The Court) I thought you said \$800?

A It was \$800 when it closed, but it only paid out about 28%, whatever it paid out. It was about \$800.

Q And it is now in the Walkersville Bank?

A Yes. It is somewhere around two or three hundred dollars.

Q That has never been collected, has it? A. No, sir.

Q What is your suggestion about the appointment of a trustee? Do you think it advisable to have a trustee for everything she owns at this time? A. No indeed.

Q Why not?

A Well, there is a trustee for that house of hers.

Q There is? Who is it?

A Coblentz and Nelson Stauffer. That was just for the purpose of, you know that house caught on fire and we had to remodel it, and the insurance people wouldn't pay me the money, and they had to have somebody appointed to handle that \$1300, or something like that, to repair the house. That is why that was done.
